Rokos Graduate Scholarship in Economics or Economic History

Funded by College alumnus Chris Rokos, this scholarship offers three years of support for a student working towards the DPhil (PhD) in economics or in economic and social history.

The scholarship covers all University and College fees, and provides a stipend for living costs comparable to the standard Research Councils UK rate, which was £14,296 in 2016/17. It is tenable for three years, starting with academic year 2017/18.

The student will work with and be supervised by [Dr Brian A'Hearn](#), fellow and tutor in Economics at Pembroke College. Dr A'Hearn is an economic historian of modern Europe, with a particular focus on Italy. His interests include institutions and political economy, human capital and education, technology, banking, the economy of cities and economic geography, anthropometrics, living standards and inequality.

How to Apply

The student must apply to and be accepted by the relevant DPhil programme in the Department of Economics or the History Faculty. **The application deadline for the academic year 2017/18 is 20th January, 2017 for both programmes.**

Applicants should send an additional copy of the application materials submitted for the relevant DPhil to the College's Academic Office (using the email address below). In cases where the fit between a student's research plans and Dr A'Hearn's interests and expertise is not obvious, an applicant may wish to submit an (optional) additional statement addressing this issue. The successful candidate will be chosen from among the applicants accepted by either of the relevant DPhil programmes by a panel of economists and historians.
